


Voices of the Golden West: *Our California Stories*

Join editor Sylvia Worden and her guest writers who will explore some personal stories of their experiences settling in California as Orange Coast College Friends of the Library launches the Spring 2011 program on Tuesday, March 1, at 7:00 p.m. in the OCC Library Lecture Room.

Sylvia and her writers will share tales included in "Voices of the Golden West: Our California Stories," a collection of 89 true stories collected for the California Stories Initiative. The project was funded by a California Council on the Humanities grant sponsored by the Golden West College Foundation.



Sylvia, associate dean of Orange Coast College's Student Health Center for the past two years, is a nurse practitioner and health educator. She began collecting

the stories for her book while she was head of Golden West College's Student Health Center.

Initially she gathered stories from speech students at Golden West College, but soon cast a wide net by visiting senior centers. She discovered a group of retirees who were already participating in a life story writing class. Several submissions were written by members of the Braille Center.

The stories describe experiences from the turn of the century to present day, as authors describe their arrival in the golden state.

It is not the first book Sylvia has created, and it won't be the last. She wrote a children's book inspired by a visit to China to adopt her young daughter, Anabel, now 12, who was known in her orphanage as "Beautiful Music," the book title. The volume was illustrated by her 17-year-old son, Ira, when he was just nine years old.

Sylvia plans to continue collecting stories from Californians as a project when she eventually retires. "There are so many highly educated retired people here," she explained. "At this point in life, you know what a good story is."

Admission to the March 1 program is free for FOTL members. Donation at the door for nonmembers is \$5 or a gently used book. Credit vouchers are available for OCC students, who may attend at no charge. Parking in Lot E, on Merrimac Way between Harbor Boulevard and Fairview Road, is free for program attendees.

Refreshments will be served. Books will also be available for purchase by Lido Village Books.

Library Adds 'Student Friendly' Improvements



Artwork, plasma television screens, a new bike rack and park benches in the Library plaza are just a few of the improvements that are making the Library more attractive and student-friendly, according to Joe Poshek, dean of the Library and head of OCC's Visual and Performing Arts Division.

New artwork adorns walls of

the Library, including a three-panel photograph donated by OCC photography professor Rick Steadry and art provided by Librarian Debbie Webb. Another photo, valued at \$20,000 and given to OCC by the estate of Doree Dunlap, hangs in the David Grant Reading Room. Dunlap, the first director of the Frank M. Doyle Arts Pavilion, passed away in 2007.

Friends of the Library donated \$1,250 to help pay for a pair of \$2,500 plasma screens that will alert students about Library activities. The Library will use economical flash drives to provide content for the plasma displays.

Anonymous donors and the OCC Foundation provided funds for five cement benches inscribed in memory of the late Library director Don Ackley and George Ciarlo and Shirley Brooke, who bequeathed funds to the Library. Another

The Friends of the Library is collecting book donations for the annual Spring Book Sale that will take place on Tuesday, April 26th, at the OCC Library.

Book titles range from bestsellers to computer manuals. Most books sell for \$1.

Annual dues are \$20 for individuals, \$30 for couples, and \$5 for students. Lifetime membership (not available to students) is \$150 and includes an annual campus parking permit.

bench honors Giles Brown, a charter faculty member who retired in 1959, and his late wife, Beth Brown, OCC's first librarian. Cost of each bench is \$1,500.

Student gate counts continue to increase with each passing semester, Poshek observed, and he predicted that the recent opening of the campus' largest classroom facility – the Allied Health, Biological Sciences and Consumer Health and Sciences (ABC) Complex – will attract even more student traffic.

Three buildings that make up the \$49.3 million ABC Complex opened at the start of the spring semester. The project, which includes an additional \$6 million in medical and science equipment, was funded using Measure C bond funds approved by voters in 2002.

"With the new ABC building, Starbucks, Art Center and the Doyle Arts Pavilion, the OCC Library truly is becoming the center of campus," he added.

A grand opening celebration for the ABC Complex is planned sometime in March.

FOTL Hosts May Program on Nature Photography


Greg Russell will present "Finding a Sense of Place in the American West" on Tuesday, May 3rd, at 7:00 p.m. in the OCC Library Lecture Room in a program sponsored by OCC Friends of the Library.

Greg, a biological sciences instructor at OCC since 2008, is also a professional photographer who specializes in nature and landscape photography.

"Because I was born and have lived my entire life in the American West, the landscapes, people, culture and values of the West have helped shape who I am today," he said. "I feel at home in the mountains and canyons I grew up exploring."

Using his images, Greg tries to give the viewer an authentic sense of attachment and belonging to the environment. "I make images of landscapes that connect me to these places," he explained. "Often they are intimate scenes whose beauty may not be immediately obvious to the casual observer."

Greg doesn't carry a lot of equipment on family vacations, where he does much of his nature photography. He uses a single camera body, a Canon 5D Mark II, and three lenses.
