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U.S. Dept. of Transportation Redesignates OCC Waterfront Campus a 2024 "Center of Excellence"

Prange Coast College has been named one of 32 Centers of Excellence for Domestic Maritime Workforce Training and Education (CoE) for 2024 by the United States Department of Transportation's Maritime Administration (MARAD). OCC is one of three institutions in California to receive this designation in 2024 and was one of MARAD's inaugural CoE in 2021.

"These programs continue to be the standard of excellence in maritime training and education," says OCC President Angelica Suarez. "The CoE redesignation recognizes OCC's tremendous value in preparing students for careers in the nation's vital maritime industry."

MARAD grants institutions that receive the CoE designation permission to identify as recipients. Designees may state that MARAD has determined their institution and their maritime training programs meet the qualifying standards as stated in 46 US Code § 54102, approved by the U.S. Congress in 2018.

CoE designations assist the maritime industry in obtaining and maintaining the highest quality workforce. The designation recognizes and promotes support for post-secondary maritime training programs that prepare students for careers in the marine industry.

"We're looking forward to this continued partnership with MARAD," says OCC Waterfront Campus Manager Greg Wisener. "OCC's professional mariner program continues to grow and evolve with enhanced facilities to prepare students for successful private or commercial vessel operations careers."

OCC Launches MESA Program to Support Underserved STEM Students

Orange Coast College received a \$1.6 million grant from the state Chancellor's Office for the creation of a MESA (Mathematics, Engineering, Science Achievement) program.

Theresa De Los Santos, who has served as a classified professional at OCC in both Instruction and Student Services, was appointed OCC MESA Director on February 12. She will lead the implementation of the MESA program and develop programming to support student retention. By the Fall semester, De Los Santos hopes to have student cohorts who will have access to workshops, guided review sessions, and academic counseling, all with a STEM-centered focus in mind.

Historically, OCC supported STEM students through the OCC STEM Academy, but that program phased out at the end of 2023 as the Federal Title V grant ended. OCC's MESA program is different in that it zeroes in on providing support to STEM students from underserved and underrepresented students to eliminate equity gaps. To qualify for the MESA program, students must be calculus-based STEM majors, be first-generation, and have demonstrated financial need.

MESA students will have access to the MESA Center located in the C&L Building to support the growing MESA student community. The MESA Center will undergo renovations later this Spring semester to make it more welcoming and inviting for students. The OCC Foundation will fund the renovation.

OCC's MESA program will host an Open House on Tuesday, April 30, at 5 p.m. in conjunction with Discover OCC, an annual event that invites prospective students to campus to learn more about the College. Prospective students will have the opportunity to express interest in joining OCC's MESA program during the Open House.

OCC Umoja Hosted Civil Rights Icon Bettie Mae Fikes for Black History Month Celebration

Celebrated Civil Rights icon Bettie Mae Fikes shared her story on Feb. 14 with an eager Orange Coast College audience

of students, classified professionals, and faculty. As she moved seamlessly between spoken word and song, her buttery, graveled voice revealed a generation's complicated history and pain. "When I sing all these songs, I go back to all this history." She recounted her stories as a little girl living in a world where the grownups protected her from injustice to the seemingly overnight troubles that erupted during the 1960s civil rights movement in Selma, Alabama. "Montgomery to Selma - I wish you would have been there so you can feel what I'm talking about."

Dubbed "the voice of Selma," Fikes was a core member of the SNCC Freedom Singers and has performed on the stages of Carnegie Hall, the Newport Jazz Festival, and the Library of Congress. She is a recipient of the Long Walk to Freedom Award.



She has recently been inducted into the Smithsonian Institute's 'Museum of Tolerance' in an exhibition honoring women of the Civil Rights. Her speeches about diversity and civil rights are universal, timely, and transgenerational.

"Who would have thought?" Fikes said. "I traveled this country - People who didn't speak English understood these songs - touching someone's heart."

"Stories, Songs, and Reflections with Ms. Fikes" was one of the many 2024 Black History Month celebrations hosted by Umoja with the message "Honoring our past and embracing our now."

"We have a campus full of excited students, and we will continue to have these conversations. It is part of who we are every day," OCC President Anjelica Suarez said. "The takeaway is to learn your history because it informs our today and shapes our future."

ASOCC President Madison Harris Featured in CCC System Podcast




