STEP 1: APPLY TO ORANGE COAST COLLEGE

Complete the [online application](#) for the semester you plan to attend. Select the option for “enrolling in high school and college at the same time.” You do not need to reapply each semester unless you skip two primary semesters (Fall and Spring), or you will be graduating from high school and attending as a First-Time College Student.

STEP 2: COMPLETE THE OCC DUAL ENROLLMENT FORM

After you receive your OCC Acceptance Email, which includes your OCC Student ID Number, complete the [Concurrent Enrollment Form](#). It is a good idea to include all the classes you are considering taking this semester on the form, because sometimes your first choice may be unavailable at your registration date. Be sure it has the appropriate signatures (parent/guardian and your HS Principal). Email it to dualenrollment@occ.cccd.edu. You will be notified via email when the form is processed.

STEP 3: REGISTER FOR THE APPROVED COURSE(S) ON YOUR FORM

You may register for your approved courses anytime on or after your registration window opens. View when your window opens on your [MyCoast Account](#). Log into MyCoast → select the “Registration” tab → find “Registration Status & Checklist.” All registration is done online in your MyCoast portal. Check out this video – [How to Register](#) – for a step-by-step guide on how to register. After you register, pay your course fees to secure your seat in the class; you may be dropped from the class for not paying your fees on time.

[COURSE COSTS]

California high school students who take a course at OCC do not have to pay the per unit enrollment fee.
