Victory Flag Stays at Coast After Pirates Top Dons, 38-17

For the second year in a row the Orange Coast College football team can claim ownership to the "Victory Flag" after the Pirates posted a 38-17 win over Santa Ana on Saturday afternoon at Eddie West Field.

The Pirates (5-3, 3-1 in Southern Conference), who jumped out to a 21-0 lead early in the second quarter, racked up a well-balanced 368 yards of total offense (207 passing, 161 rushing).

Wide receiver Stefan Derrick had another monster game, catching six passes for 142 yards and two touchdowns, all coming from quarterback Mason Dossey, who threw for 207 yards on 15-of-28 passing.

The rushing tandem of Kyle White and Daniel Rodriguez pounded the Dons (1-7, 0-4) throughout the afternoon. White had 92 yards on 14 carries, while Rodriguez

notched 70 rushing yards and two touchdowns on 19 carries.

A nice opening kickoff by Darrel Watts gave Coast the ball near midfield, OCC needed just three plays to find the end zone as Dossey connected with Derrick on a 41-yard touchdown completion, putting the Pirates up 7-0 after a Dan Bjurman PAT.

Derrick Worthy ended Santa Ana's opening drive with an interception on the Coast 20-yard line and on the following possession, the Pirates marched 64 yards on 10 plays and made it 14-0 on another Dossey-to-Derrick touchdown strike and Bjurman PAT.

Late in the first quarter, an airmailed snap over Dons' quarterback Jason Habash was recovered by the Pirates' Keith Ford inside Santa Ana's 8-yard line and two plays later, Rodriguez plowed into the end zone from a yard out to make it 21-0 just 26 seconds into the second quarter.

Santa Ana made it 21-3 on a 29-yard field goal by Jonah Mack and in the third quarter, the Dons made it 21-10 on a 32-yard touchdown strike from Habash to Dorion Bennett.

But Coast responded to the Dons' push and pushed right back with a six-play, 83-yard drive that ended with a 5-yard touchdown run by Rodriguez to put the Pirates up 28-10.

Bjurman connected on a 29-yard field goal to make it 31-10, but with 1:39 left in the game, Santa Ana scored on a 25-yard TD pass from Connor Burke to Bennett.

However, on the ensuing onside kick, Matthew Nelson not only recovered the ball for Coast, he ran the ball back 45 yards for a touchdown to complete OCC's fifth victory of the season.

Defensively, the Pirates were led by Gilbert Gildersleeve, who had eight tackles (seven solo) and three pass break-ups and Derrick Worthy, who had the aforementioned interception, one quarterback sack and two pass break-ups to go along with his six tackles.

Coast will return to LeBard Stadium for a "road" game against rival Golden West in the annual "West-Coast Showdown" on Nov. 7, beginning at 6 p.m.

Arts Pavilion Exhibit Features Portraits of Master Painters in Grid Format

Sacramento artist D. L. Thomas will show his portraits of the masters of modernist painting — including Van Gogh and Picasso — at the Frank M. Doyle Arts Pavilion from Nov. 4 until Dec. 5. The gallery will host an artist talk on Nov. 4 at 3 p.m. followed that evening by an opening reception from 5-7:30 p.m.

The exhibition, titled, "Rogues Gallery," will feature an ensemble of up to 80 12 x 9-inch portraits, which will be spread across the wall in a grid or frieze. Thomas' skeptical view of the artists will be reflected in the way he arranges them in rows on the wall, much like a police lineup; viewers will actually be looking at two exhibitions — the individual portraits and the totality of the frieze, considered as a separate work of art.

The frieze can be seen as a puzzle or acrostic, which can be read horizontally, vertically or even diagonally, since the relation of the artists to each other makes a statement about who they are. The frieze also will include a few older artists (such as da Vinci) whose likeness is not known and who will be represented by one of their paintings, reflecting Thomas' belief that an artist's true portrait is to be found in his or her works.

"Rogues Gallery" will be open from 11 a.m. until 5 p.m. on

Speech and Debate Team Builds on Winning Record at Two Competitions

The Orange Coast College Speech, Debate and Readers Theater team recently brought home wins from both the Jannese Davidson Tournament at Concordia University in Irvine and the Lancer Tournament at Pasadena City College.

A small but powerful squad of Pirates demonstrated speech competency against numerous colleges from across the western part of the United States with wins that are building toward a strong fall championship.

"These tournaments were small and highly competitive," said Director of Debate Sherana Polk. "Not only is breaking to finals an achievement, but also hearing three top-10 debate speakers called from OCC is amazing."

The team's next tournament is the Palomar/Grossmont Dual Tournament, which takes place during the second weekend of November.

Theatre Dept.'s 'The Bacchae' Will Feature Puppets, Masks, Music

OCC's theatre department will present famed Greek tragedy "The Bacchae" on Nov. 13-15 and 20-22. The production will be performed in the Drama Lab Studio on Friday, Saturday and Sunday evenings at 7:30 p.m., with a final Sunday matinee at 2:30 p.m. in lieu of the evening performance.

An adaptation of Euripides' famous story of mortal brutality, scandal and godly revenge, the performance will incorporate unique elements like puppets and masks.

"Our production of The Bacchae is different because it uses puppets — both Buranku and shadow puppets — to tell the story, as well as a vastly abridged script," said Director David Scaglione. "The Bacchae is an important story to tell because it analyzes the moral dilemma of greatness versus the folly of revenge, and how pointless revenge is to the human experience."

Student actors will use the puppets to engage with the audience, with the Greek Chorus playing a minimal role in the performance. "I feel that the Greek Chorus, though interesting, is an archaic theatrical device," said Scaglione. "The play is immersive but short. I'm just telling the story here ... no added fluff."

Pirate Women Place Second at OEC Championships

The Orange Coast College women's cross country team earned a trip to next week's Regional Meet after a solid, second-place team performance at the 2015 Orange Empire Conference Meet, held on Oct. 30 at Mason Park.

The Pirates, who had three runners finish in the top-10 in scoring, earned the runner-up spot with a team score of 61 points, topped only by OEC champion Riverside (32). Saddleback (76) finished third, while Santa Ana (103) placed fourth. All four teams will advance to the Southern California Regional Meet, set for Nov. 6 at Mission Bay Park in San Diego, beginning at 10 a.m.

OCC freshman Alyssa Allen was the pace-setter for the Pirates and finished third with a 5K time of 19 minutes, 54.96 seconds. She was one of just four runners to break the 20-minute mark and was topped only by OEC champion Toni Lopez of Santa Ana (19:16.01) and Riverside's Brianna Jacklin (19:23.88).

Two other Coast runners cracked the top-10, as sophomore Janessa Allen placed eighth with a time of 20:14.5 and Bethani Heising finished ninth with a 20:19.29.

Other point earners for OCC included freshman Karen Cruz (21:10.54) and freshman Rebecca Ross (21:25.62). Other strong times for the Pirates were turned in by sophomore Daisy Vazquez (21:48.05), freshman Jennifer Romero (22:29.33), freshman Tarah Buckels (24:27.8) and Kirsten McCracken (24:36.83).

Pirates Fare Well in Row For the Cure Regatta

The Orange Coast College men's crew headed down to Mission Bay to compete in the 2015 Row for the Cure regatta on Sunday and the results were solid, according to first-year OCC head coach Cam Brown.

The Pirates entered three squads in the Men's Open 8+ and competed against a crew from UC San Diego and two entries from UCLA. UCSD placed first with the OCC 'A' entry 6 seconds behind in second place. OCC also placed third and fifth, respectively, with UCLA in fourth and sixth positions.

"The Coast Crews were able to get good experience of racing in preparation for our upcoming regattas and identified several areas to work on in the coming weeks," Brown said.

Coast will race in San Pedro for at the Head of the Harbor regatta, hosted by USC, on Nov. 8.
