Speech Team Makes History with 4th Straight National Championship

Orange Coast College's Speech and Debate team has done what no other community college has ever done: won four national championships in a row.

On April 9-14 more than 50 community colleges from across the country competed for the national championship at the Phi Rho Pi National Speech and Debate Tournament in Daytona Beach, Fla. OCC took the top spot, scoring more points than any other school in the country.

Speech and debate competitions consist of many different types of events — much like track and field — from debate, to platform speaking, to limited prep, and even acting events. All students compete in preliminary rounds, after which a select few advance to the final rounds of competition. Those individual successes are added up to determine a team's total points.

This year's Phi Rho Pi national championship was incredibly close; Mt. San Antonio College from Walnut, Calif. came in second with 241 points, with Coast edging them out with 251 points. "The week had us on the edge of our seats the entire time, but our confidence in our preparation and our students never wavered" said Sherana Polk, Director of Forensics at OCC.

Coast started strong with a huge lead when the semi-final rounds were posted, but Mt. Sac made a late surge, bringing things back into contention. OCC's students staved off a late comeback and secured their victory with an impressive display in Persuasive and Impromptu speaking, taking three gold medals in each event.

"The individuals on the team did incredibly well, but the amazing thing about this week was that the focus was never on the individual, and always on the team. It's why we won," said Shauhin Davari, OCC's Director of Interpretive Events. "Some of our best events didn't do well, but the students were unfazed. They were laser-focused on one goal — a team win."

That's not to say there weren't incredible individual successes; out of 300 competitors OCC's Krista Aparadian won the Bovero-Tabor top speaker award of the tournament. This was the second year in a row she achieved this feat, one of only two people in history to do so. Stevie Vu won the Warren-Dahlin Student Fellowship award, which was voted on by the other competitors in her region, honoring her as the person who best represents the values of forensics. Bryan Davis also picket-fenced Persuasive Speaking, which means he received a first-place ranking in every single round he competed in; this is very rare at the national competition, due to the superior quality of competitors.

"These are just a tiny portion of all the awards that deserve to be mentioned and celebrated," said Sean Connor, OCC's Director of Platform Speaking. "All of the awards don't happen without this team's incredible work ethic; these students were on campus practicing for 40 to 50 hours during spring break. That's their commitment, that's what it takes to win, and they wanted it."

There will be an Orange Coast College-themed display prior to the game at the University Village in the Gate 1 Courtyard and OCC-themed elements throughout the game.

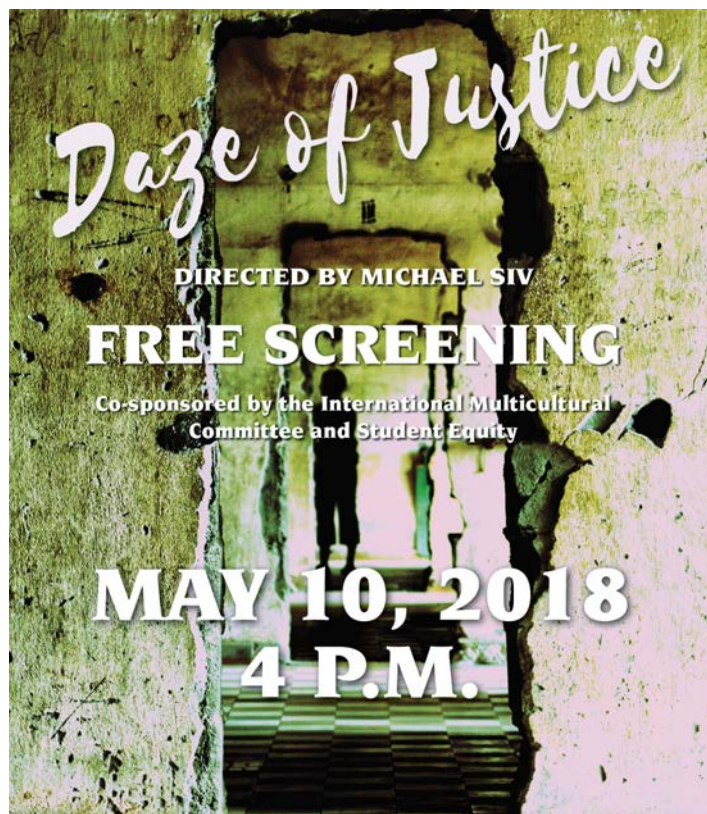
Members of the College will be on the field to throw out the first pitch, with a fireworks show and movie following the game.

OCC Will Screen Documentary, Host Panel in Recognition of Genocide Awareness Month

OCC's Global Engagement Center will host a screening of the documentary "Daze of Justice" on Thursday, May 10 at 4 p.m. followed by a panel discussion that will include the film's director.

"Daze of Justice" tells the story of Cambodian-American women who testify before a UN Special Tribunal about their traumatic experiences under the Khmer Rouge regime from 1975-1979. The Special Tribunal prosecuted members of the Khmer Rouge, who stood accused of killing more than one million Cambodians in a region now referred to as the "killing fields."

The film follows the research of Dr. Leakhana Nou and gives voice to the survivors of the killing fields.

Director Michael Siv — himself a survivor of the killing fields — will be a part of the panel discussion, as well as Dr. Nou and other fellow survivors.

Theatre Dept. Will Stage Cabaret Musical May 4-13

OCC's theatre department will stage a production of "Cabaret," a musical by Joe Masterhoff, from May 4 until May 13 in the Drama Lab Theatre. Performances are scheduled for 7:30 p.m. on May 4-6, and May 11 and 12. There will be a matinee performance at 2:30 p.m. on Sunday, May 13.

Cabaret takes place as the 1920s draw to a close, with a garish Master of Ceremonies welcoming the audience and assuring them that they will forget all of their troubles in the cabaret. Director and OCC Theatre instructor, Tom Bruno, chose the musical with current events in mind.

"The musical takes place during the rise of the Nazi party in Berlin, and people are just interested in having a good time, not paying attention to the political landscape," says Bruno. "We've recently seen a resurgence of unkind and downright hateful rhetoric within our political system, and it seemed to me that Cabaret would be a very timely production to remind audiences that, as Edmund Burke said: 'The only thing necessary for the triumph of evil is for good men to do nothing.' Our production will, I hope, communicate this message to our audience."

Students actors will perform in the production, which has been in the works for months.

"The students involved are some of the most dedicated, committed and talented performers I have ever had the pleasure to work with," says Bruno. "They show up to rehearsals hours beforehand to work on their own, I really cannot speak more highly of them. I am truly blown away by the extraordinary talent we have assembled here at OCC."

Save the Date: Honors Night 2018

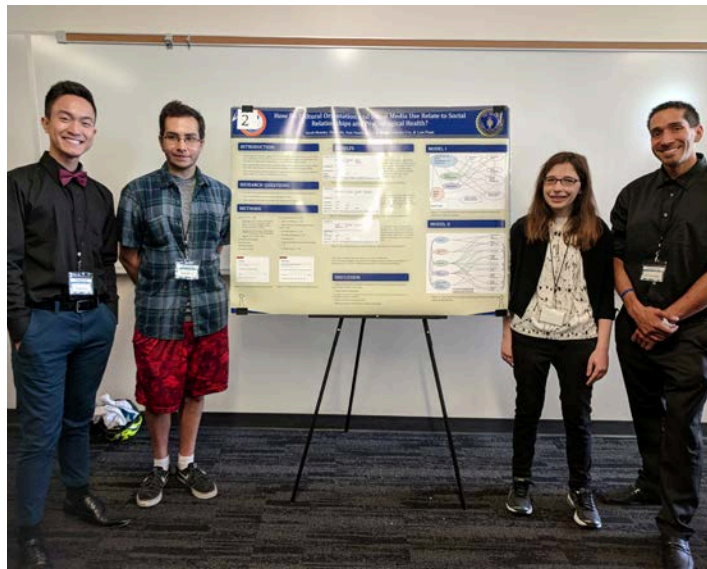
This year's Honors Night will take place on Wednesday May 9, from 4-8 p.m.

Students from OCC's chapter of PsiBeta gave two poster presentations at the school's annual Giles T. Brown Student Project and Research Symposium on April 13, earning a 2nd place award for their efforts.

PsiBeta is a national honor society for psychology students at community colleges. The two poster topics presented at the Symposium were titled "How Do Cultural Orientation and Social Media Use Relate to Social Relationships and Psychological Health" and "How do Self Esteem, Depression and Social Media Use Correlate with the Mental Health and Relationships of College Students." Each poster presentation was followed by a question and answer period, giving students a chance to explain their work.

OCC's Research Symposium gives students a chance to present the work they do inside and outside the classroom, highlighting many different disciplines on campus. In addition to a Poster Presentation session, students also were able to participate in an Exhibition of Work (suitable for creative works such as sculpture and machined products) and Oral (or Paper) Presentation, featuring a 15-minute oral presentation followed by 5 minutes of questions.

Pirates Baseball Repeat as OEC champs; Will Host Playoffs as No. 2 Seed

Thanks to a 12-5 win over Riverside City College on April 27 afternoon, the Orange Coast College baseball team clinched the outright Orange Empire Conference title for the second year in a row and will be the No. 2 seed for this year's Southern California Regional playoffs, which kick off on Friday at Wendell Pickens Field.

Coby Kauhaahaa went 4-for-4 with two runs and an RBI, while Ramiro Velasco went 2-for-4 with a home run, a run scored and three RBI for the Pirates (27-13, 15-6 in OEC), who won back-to-back conference titles for the first time in 31 seasons.

"It's been an up-and-down season for sure, but I'm very proud of these guys for battling through to get to where we are now," OCC head coach John Altobelli said. "We've had some injuries and some moments of streaky play, but when we are clicking on all cylinders, I like the make-up of this team and when it comes to the playoffs, we need to play our best baseball in the weeks to come.

"To win this conference is a feat all its own. It's the toughest conference in the state and to be able to do it back-to-back years says a lot about the character of this team and our sophomores who made it happen. We came close last year to the State Final Four -- hopefully we can make it over the hump this year."

Skylar Limonchi (2-for-6, two runs, one RBI), Murphy Stehly (2-for-5, two runs, one RBI) and Landon Silver (2-for-4, one RBI) also produced multi-hit games for Coast.

Velasco's home run -- his team-leading fifth of the season -- was a two-run shot in the seventh inning that helped propel OCC's run-scoring barrage in the final three innings.

Starter Cameron Jabara notched his fifth win of the season without a loss, allowing just two runs on nine hits with five strikeouts over seven innings. Coast led 4-1 after six innings before battering the Tigers' bullpen with eight runs over the final three innings.

With the win, Coast earned a No. 2 seed in the upcoming Southern California Regional playoffs. OCC will host the highest remaining seed from Tuesday's play-in games between No. 15 Cuesta vs. No. 18 Southwestern and No. 16 San Diego Mesa and No. 17 L.A. Pierce. The lowest remaining seed will travel to Cerritos College to take on the top-seeded Falcons (29-11).

Game one for OCC will take place on Friday, May 4 at 2 p.m. at Wendell Pickens Field. Game 2 will begin at 11 a.m. on Saturday, May 5 with a third game immediately to follow Game 2, if necessary.

This is the 13th appearance in the playoffs over the past 14 seasons for the Pirates, who are going for their seventh state baseball title in school history (1956, 1960, 1980, 2009, 2014, 2015). This year's OEC crown is also the 19th conference baseball title in school history.
