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Campus Community Invited to Retirement Party for President Harkins Nov. 9

OCC invites the campus and community to bid farewell to President Dennis Harkins as he embarks on his retirement on Friday, Nov. 9 from 2-4 p.m. in the Doyle Arts Pavilion.

Dr. Harkins is OCC's 10th, and the third-longest-serving, president. He is set to retire after nine years at the helm, and has plans to move to Florida with his wife, Kim.

Hired in 2009, President Harkins oversaw significant changes at Coast during his tenure, including the passage of Bond Measure M, which spurred several construction projects such as the College's Math Business and Computing Center, Recycling Center, Allied Health Sciences, Biological Sciences and Consumer Sciences Complex, and the much-anticipated OCC Planetarium, which is set to open early next year.

Light refreshments will be served at the retirement event.

OCC Symphony's 'European Connection' Concert Set for Nov. 10

The OCC Symphony will honor the work of wellknown European composers, performing music by Mozart, Rossini, and Ravel on Saturday, Nov. 10 at 7:30 p.m. in the Robert B. Moore Theatre.

The Symphony will open the concert with Rossini's famous overture to his comic opera — "La Scala di Seta." Of this popular piece OCC Symphony Conductor Maxim Kuzin says "As always, Rossini's music, composed



by the 'god of opera' in the first half of the 19th century, is extremely inventive and exciting."

Next the Symphony will move on to a pair of popular pieces by one of the most famous composers in history: Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart.

"OCC's Symphony continues the exploration of Mozart's heritage," says Kuzin. "In this concert, our audience will hear the genius' well-known Symphony No. 40 in G minor. This symphony stands out among the Mozart's 41 numbered symphonies for being one of the only two symphonies in minor mode while also having the unusual lamenting and even furious character of the first movement."

Concert-goers also will be treated to a performance of Mozart's Concerto for Flute and Orchestra No. 1 in G major, by guest flutist Anastasia Petanova. The prodigious Petanova has degrees from Moscow, Peabody, and UCLA.

To finish the evening, the orchestra will perform Ravel's "Pavane Pour Une Infante Défunte" (Pavane for a Dead Princess), which the composer described as "an evocation of a pavane that a little princess might, in former times, have danced at the Spanish court."

OCC Library Invites Award Winning Faculty to Give Talk

Orange Coast College part-time English faculty member Rachelle Cruz will give a book talk in the OCC Library on Thursday, Nov. 8 at 2 p.m. Cruz will read from her new book "Experiencing Comics," which will be available for purchase and signing.

The talk will be located in room 112 of the Library and is co-sponsored by OCC's Friends of the Library.

"Experiencing Comics" is an introductory guide to comics that aims to teach readers how to "critically examine the craft and storytelling techniques found inside a graphic novel or comic" (www.rachellecruz.com). The book can be used in a number



of humanities or social science disciplines, including creative writing, comparative literature, gender or ethnic studies and sexuality courses.

"As a poet and comics reader and fan, I'm really interested in the intersection between these two forms," says Cruz. "I wrote a guide on reading comics because I longed for an accessible text for students new to comics and for avid comics fans alike that could could help them to slow down their reading and deepen their critical thinking and writing skills."

Cruz also is the author of a collection of poetry titled "God's Will for Monsters," which won an American Book Award this year and the Hillary Gravendyk Regional Poetry Prize in 2016. She is originally from Hayward, Calif. and has taught at OCC part time for more than five years.

An Emerging Voices Fellow, Kundiman Fellow, and VONA writer, Cruz earned her master of fine arts degree in creative writing and the performing arts from University of California, Riverside, and her bachelor's degree in liberal arts/liberal studies from Sarah Lawrence College. She teaches courses in comics, poetry, English and creative writing at OCC and at the University of California, Riverside.

Pirates Finish Second at OEC Water Polo Championships

The Orange Coast College men's water polo team finished second overall in the Orange Empire Conference following action from last weekend's OEC Championships, hosed by Fullerton College.

Coast (17-7) earned a first round bye before knocking off Riverside City College, 12-5, in the semifinals. OCC trailed the Tigers (9-16) 3-2 after the opening quarter before blowing past RCC with a 9-1 run over the middle two quarters.

Nicholas Fichman led the Pirates with five goals and three steals, while Angel Rosado added three goals to go along with a pair of steals. Single tallies were scored by Gera Garcia, Eduardo Wainberg, Luke Rhone and Ryan Baumann.

In goal, Conor Halloran came up with 10 big saves and held the Tigers to just two goals over the final three quarters.

In the final, Coast took on top-seeded Golden West and fell to the Rustlers, 16-7. OCC hung tough against the Rustlers (21-1) and trailed 8-5 at the half. But GWC pulled away by outscoring OCC 8-2 over the final two quarters.

Fichman led the way with three goals and four steals, while Baumann added two goals for the Pirates, who will advance to this weekend's Southern California Regionals as the No. 4 seed. Coast will open Regional play against Cerritos on Nov. 9 at 3:15 p.m. at Cerritos College.
